FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Improved functionality for library's research guides

Many pages on the library website are in transition as librarians create [research guides](#) that provide one-stop access to important resources, services, and instructional materials. The sample below shows content from the [Videos](#) tab on the [Early Childhood Education](#) guide. On this page, users can access relevant streaming video databases and individual videos, information about featured DVDs, forms for requesting a video that the library lacks, and [Ask a Librarian](#) options. A link

also is provided to the Library Catalog's advanced keyword search form, next to an illustration showing how to limit such searches to UHCL videos.



A LOOK BACK IN TIME

The children of Max Faget, American engineer and designer who died in 2004 at age 83, have donated their father's professional and personal papers, including photographs, awards, yearbooks, home movies, scrapbooks, and letters to the UH-Clear Lake Archives. The collection, which provides a valuable glimpse into the personal history of a man considered an icon of the space program, will be made available to the public once processed, in about 18-24 months.

Government connections at your fingertips


