

SEABROOK

The history of Seabrook has encompassed many facets of life along the shores of Clear Lake and Galveston Bay. Settled in the 1860's, Seabrook became a haven for fishermen, hunters, and persons who wished to have a place where they could slow down and appreciate the beauty of a sunset across the bay, a flight of teal or pin tails in a late winter's sky; where, if their wants were simple, they could by their own efforts wrest a living from the sea and the land around it. Names still heard in Seabrook; streets and subdivisions bear witness to their presence. These were some of the early developers; Ballentine, Brummerhop, Tod, Porter, Gale, Hammer, Nicholson, Chapman, Wiltzie, Menard, Larrabee, Morris, all old-timers; people who from time to time with vision, hope, and faith invested in the future of the area.

Time passed, the century turned, other interests, other people, agriculture, cattle, the development of the Coast as a recreation area, sailing, the growth of Houston; new names to add to the "old timers", Robinson, Curry, Muecke, Christy, Maupin, Dickerson and Shove.

It became an area to relax in, a place to recover from the scars of the rough and tumble world outside, but by the '20s and '30s the rumble could be heard by those whose ears were keen; events on the other side of the earth were occurring that would lift Seabrook into the world of the future. Einstein, Von Braun, Bohr, men who never heard of Seabrook shaped her destiny. War!!! and its ache and pain. Peace!!! with its promise of the good life. Then the rumble became a roar that could not be ignored. "Sputnik" what's that? "The Moon--we can't live with our own neighbors. New names Carpenter, Glenn, Conrad and all the others, a different generation, a different set of goals, men with a different heritage and background and yet they fit so well into the Seabrook philosophy. A willingness to experiment, yet a desire to cling to the best of the past; no fear of the future and a respect for the experience and knowledge of yesteryear. Seabrook by its very name, the quiet peace of a brook and the tremendous latent undeveloped power of the sea--the perfect combination.







Section 1. The purpose of this act is to provide for the better regulation of the trade in slaves and to prevent the same from being carried on in violation of the laws of the United States.

Section 2. Any person who shall be found guilty of carrying on the trade in slaves in violation of the laws of the United States shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars or imprisoned not more than six months, or both.

Section 3. Any person who shall be found guilty of aiding or abetting in the carrying on of the trade in slaves in violation of the laws of the United States shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars or imprisoned not more than six months, or both.

Section 4. Any person who shall be found guilty of harboring or concealing any slave in violation of the laws of the United States shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars or imprisoned not more than six months, or both.

Section 5. Any person who shall be found guilty of obstructing or interfering with the execution of the laws of the United States relating to the trade in slaves shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars or imprisoned not more than six months, or both.

Section 6. Any person who shall be found guilty of violating any of the provisions of this act shall be liable to the penalties therein provided.
