Neumann librarians look forward to welcoming faculty and students to our new 21st century library at the Pearland campus! The library will incorporate many of the latest trends in providing space to study, scholarly resources, and services.

Librarians have planned an inviting learning environment with up-to-the-minute technology and good old-fashioned services. The Pearland campus library will provide access to over 100,000 ebooks and approximately 50,000 ejournals. These will be supplemented by the collections at the home library, available through online request forms and delivered within a day or two. Course reserves also will be provided.

For students to be successful, understanding the scholarly communication process is important. Onsite library staff will help students find their way through the digital landscape of academic research, teaching them to find, use, and evaluate information. Help also will be available from librarians at the home campus.

The Pearland library will be a place for students to meet, study, interact with each other and relax. There will be flexible seating so that students can rearrange the furniture to suit their needs, whether they are studying in teams or individually. Desktop computers will be available, as will laptop-friendly seating and a wifi network.

The time-tested, internationally recognized LibQUAL+® survey instrument was developed by researchers at Texas A&M University and the Association of Re-



New website navigation options

Following user testing, the library website has a new look. The menu underneath the banner appears on every page of the site and includes mouse-over, drop-down menus for all entries except *Home*, *Library Catalog*, and *Databases A-Z*. The *Search for* box on the homepage provides immediate search capability for books, media, and

course reserves in the Library Catalog, for articles in a multiple database interface (try this when you don't want a specific database such as *ERIC*, *PsycINFO*, etc.), for journals in the Journals List, and for the web in *Google Scholar*. New feature in Journals List (formerly Ejournals List)

In addition to linking to online fulltext databases and publisher sites, the <u>UHCL</u> <u>Journals List</u> now provides links to the

Library Catalog when the library has paper copy or microfilm for a serial (a journal, magazine, or newspaper).

Moving forward with Census 2010



April 1 is Census Day, and the <u>U.S. Census Bureau</u> is working hard to encourage full participation. An accurate count of

residents determines Congressional representation and serves as the basis for many social services.

The 2010 Census is the first census to use a "short form" only. What was commonly called the "long form" in Census 2000 and earlier years is now the American Community Survey (ACS). The ACS is part of the official census but conducted throughout the decade on a rolling sample of about 2.5 percent of the population every year.

Search and manipulate data from the decennial cen-

Instructions for linking to videos, clips, & playlists

Let us know of any problems with persistent links

Using persistent links that have been modified with the library's authentication server prefix (http://libproxy.uhcl.edu/login?url=) allows you to share scholarly articles from research databases with students while avoiding concerns about copyright infringement. Advise your students to use high speed Internet services, however, to avoid occasional timed-out connections. When you encounter failures with persistent links to articles or other materials in library

databases, please email the problem link to <u>Karen Berrish</u>, Associate Director for Library Digital Services, or to <u>referencestaff@uhcl.edu</u>. When timing out isn't the issue, we can contact the database vendor and seek a solution. Please keep us informed. Thank you!
