Below is a summary of the duties and responsibilities of the elected mem-bers of the proposed Stu-dent Association Constitution.

LEGISLATIVE BODY I.Name: Student Association Council

A. No stipulation for classification.

Representation is 1% of the enrollment C. One year terms

EXECUTIVE BODY

I. Coordinating Committee

A. President Vice President and Chairpersons from each committee

The Coordinating Committee decides business to be discussed and sends issues to the Council to be voted on

II. Committees

A. Cultural committee is responsible for the film, lecture and fine arts series schedules and operations

B. Student Life and Recreation Committee is responsible for the procurement, operation and upkeep of all recreational equipment and facilities

C. Budget Committee is responsible for compiling the proposed budget requests from the committees and other student organizations. The chairperson of this committee serves as Treasurer

D. Judicial Committee serves as legal and judicial arm of the Student Association. Parlimentarian will be chairperson of this committee

III. President
A. Shall preside over the Student Council and shall have no vote except in the case of a tie.

B. Has the power to re-lease funds that have been allocated and approved by the Council

IV. The Vice President
A. Serves as a voting

member of the Coun-

cil and Coordinating

B. Works cooperatively with Chairpersons and shall be responsible for drawing up the agenda

Student Service Fees Budget

The administration has released a tentative budget for the expenditure of the student service fee funds for the academic year 1975-76. As was reported in the summer edition of the paper, most of last year's money was spent on setting up the nurse's station and paying the salaries of the nurses. There is a carryover into the medical service budget of \$7500 and the student activities funds of \$8740. All the rest has been spent.

The new \$4 medical fee does not cover the projected expenditure of \$44,500 for the cost of nurses salaries for two shifts, medical work study students and medical supplies. The fee is expected to produce about \$28,000 and with the carryover, about \$9000 will have to come from the student service fee funds.

The student service fee funds will probably total about \$120,000. From this, the salaries of the Veterans' Counselor, Financial Aid Counselor, two Records Analysts, the Chief Academic Counselor, the Coordinator of Student Services, quarter time of a guidance counselor, and the Placement Counselor are paid. Another standing expense is I.D. cards.

The student life actually budgeted is as follows:

This \$32,395 is a flexible amount and may be redistributed among the various student life programs as activities are scheduled.

HELP FOR STUDENTS

FAMILY SERVICE CENTER

Family Service Center will help you get your head together. It is lo-cated at 16915 El Camino Real, Clear Lake City, in the Beta Building, 488-0526. They offer family, marriage, and financial counseling, and homemaker services.

The homemaker is usually an experienced woman who comes into a family home when a crisis has disrupted a normal living pattern. She stays from 8 am to 5 pm and keeps a household going until mother brings the new baby home or father recovers from injury or until the family can take over again after any crisis. Family Service Center is looking for homemakers in this area. Being an exper-ienced homemaker is the most important qualifica-

The cost of al these services is on a sliding scale based on need. United Givers' Fund makes up the rest, about 50%.

Family Service Center has a program they call Family L i f e Education. They offer a multitude of classes, such as self esteem, T.A. for divorced persons, and parent training. Counselors are available to speak t o groups.

SECURITY

The UH/CLC Security Office is on the first floor of the Bayou Building near the back (student) entrance. There students may buy parking permits, get help starting or opening one's car, or get help with a flat tire. The campus police will also help in getting gas; however, they do not sell it.

LIBRARY

The library is now in the Bayou Building, located on parts of the second and third floors. Hours are as follows:

8 am - 10 pm M thru Th 8 am - 5 pm Friday 9 am - 5 pm Saturday 2 pm - 6 pm Sunday

The Library has a staff of twenty, including eight librarians. Walter Wicker is Head Librarian. Mr. Wicker is justly proud of the new library; i t i s beautiful.

The first level of the library has a large receiving area designed to provide services and information so that the stacks and study areas will be quieter. Most of will be quieter. the books are on the second level and study car-rels are in convenient places. There is a Xerox machine on the first level as well as the card catalogue -- six tons of it.

A microfilm room will open in October. Its carrels are designed by by the library staff for right and left-handed people. There will be no smoking or eating in the library. There are special smoking rooms but as of yet they have no furni-

GUITAR MUSIC

Eighteen students at UH CLC this fall will be pioneering a new type of muguitar. Music 3931 (Music in the Public School) will include techniques for all forms of music encountered in typical classroom music studies. The guitar's versatility, mobility, and relatively low cost make it very attractive as a means of music education. One out of every twenty Americans owns a guitar, and there are over three million professional guitar players.

Music 3931 is being taught by Jerry Elliott. Jerry has played the guitar professionally for 13 years on television and in clubs. He has been on the entertainment roster the White House, State Department, and Embassies in France and Germany. also composes music has had six books of poetry published, with his original art work.

The course requires no previous music training, and is open to the entire student body. Emphasis is on an open musical environment to develop the creative capacities of the students.

Guitars and cases for the course were donated by the Norlin Music Company of Chicago. Guitars will be loaned to students without fees for use during the course.

ship was in placement at the University of Arizona. Among the services she offers or plans to offer this semester are job listing (full and parttime), credentials service, employer literature, career library, resume writing and interviewing workshops, on campus interviewing, and career counseling.

Forms are being designed now for the credentials service. This will be a file into which students may put pertinent information for use by po-

tential employers.

TRIUMPH OF THE WILL, Adolf Hitler's famous propaganda film, will be shown in Room 243E Arbor Building on Thursday night October 9, 1975, at 7:30 pm. Dr. Robert Toplin, a historian, will give a brief introduction to the film.

Hitler's propaganda specialists filmed TRIUMPH OF THE WILL in Nuremberg in the mid-1930's. Scenes of thousands of soldiers, martial music, and Hitler's dramatic appearances before the crowds combine to create an eerie psychological effect in this example of the frightening potential of the movie medium.
