





# **Senior Administrative Staff**

#### **President**

The President is the chief executive officer of the University of Houston-Clear Lake and reports directly to the Chancellor of the University of Houston System. He/she establishes the administrative and academic structure for the University; chairs the University Council as a component of the shared governance structure; promotes academic excellence through planning, budgeting, implementation, and assessment; makes recommendations on legislative appropriations, annual operating budgets, capital construction projects, and priorities for private support. He/she serves as the University's chief external officer, provides leadership for administration and faculty to fulfill the University's mission, and serves as the official representative of the University and as liaison for communication between the System and the administration, faculty, staff, and students.

#### Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost

The Senior Vice President for Academic Affairs and Provost serves as the senior administrative and chief academic officer who reports directly to the President of the University. He/she is responsible for all academic administration including academic programs, student affairs, university planning, institutional research, faculty development, computing, library, enrollment management, international programs, sponsored programs, and research institutes. Emphasis is placed on responsiveness to university constituencies and working through a strong, shared governance model. The Provost is also involved in partnerships with the private sector, government, and other educational institutions. Providing leadership and support of the development of the learning assessment and institutional effectiveness plan is also a major responsibility of the position.


#### Vice President for Administration and Finance


#### **Associate Vice President for University Advancement**

Any graduate level section, whether composite, cross-listed, or individual, with less than 5 graduate level registrants and a total enrollment of less than ten registrants will be considered a small class. Small classes currently generate state funded hours. Special Note: If your course was miscoded (i.e., you listed it as a lecture rather than an individualized or thesis course—your average class size will be lower than it should be. Courses with 3 or fewer students were excluded for this purpose.










#### **Headcount Trends**









#### **Student Credit Hour Trends**

















#### **Health Center**

The mission of the Health Center is to promote academic excellence, retention, and graduation through optimizing the health of students, faculty, and staff. We also promote the wellness of clients through proactive health education and services. Health Center services are available to all currently enrolled full and part-time students, as well as all faculty and staff.

The Health Center provides clients with several no and low cost services, which include, but are not limited to:

IISS promotes the retention and empowerment of a diverse student population including racial/ethnic groups, first-generation, women, lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender, international, and underrepresented students. Through educational programs and services, we facilitate the growth of culturally competent, respectful and well-rounded global citizens.

#### Goals

The goals of the Intercultural & International Student Services Office are to:

- Assist students with their transition to UHCL
- Provide educational and cultural programming and services
- Facilitate student learning and develop leadership skills
- Promote student participation in IISS programs and services
- Enhance and expand university-wide partnerships
- Cultivate collaboration with student organizations
- Increase community outreach and partnerships
- Serve as a referral source and advocate for students.
- Foster a supportive mentoring environment
- Encourage life-long learning

#### **Programs and Services**

On average, approximately 7,000 participants directly participate in IISS sponsored programs and services each year. Programs and services include:

Intercultural Awareness Experiences - On-going educational programs provide the UHCL community participants the opportunity to enhance their global perspectives. We have various programs and events throughout the year that focus on all types of cultures. For example, we sponsor events to recognize Hispanic Heritage, Black History, Asian American, and Native American Heritage Months. We also offer Global Expo and Cultural Extravaganza programs which highlight our students' global diversity.

**Cultural Competency for Leaders** - CCL is a diversity training workshop offered to university students, staff, faculty and administrators. Participants learn about leadership, diversity, and multiculturalism issues in higher education. The CCL is a university-wide ongoing mechanism to create a welcoming environment and to promote understanding and appreciation of diversity. CCL provides an institutional response to a variety of campus issues, including racial, inter-group, prejudice, and discrimination.

**Student Advocacy**—All students with concerns, problems, or students seeking advice may request assistance from the staff of IISS. The staff serves as a resource and advisor to individuals and groups of students. Additionally, when needed, the staff serves as mediator in conflict situations.

#### **Programs and Services continued**

International Student Orientation: Mandatory International Student Orientation is held Fall, Spring & Summer on the Thursday preceding start of classes. It is the first opportunity for International Students to experience all that UHCL has to offer. Orientation provides valuable information that helps ease International Students' transition to the campus and life in the U.S. in general. Each semester, the IISS office hosts a Orientation for all new International Students. Pertinent information regarding admissions, academic and peer advising, health insurance, academic honesty policies, hurricane awareness and cross-cultural adjustment is provided by UHCL staff.

**Resource Center**—The Office maintains a collection of periodicals, books, training manuals, newsletters, audiotapes, and videos on a variety of cultural topics. A checkout procedure allows campus community members to use the materials to enhance their educational development.

**Women's and LGBT Services** — A program that is committed to providing programs that serve the needs of women and LGBT constituencies. We are dedicated to working with groups of all backgrounds, ages, abilities, and educational status. The program complements the mission of the IISS Office to support and advocate on behalf of all students.

**Celebrating Our Elders (COE)**—COE is a scholarship project supported by the University of Houston-Clear Lake. The program builds partnerships between the university, Houston-area high schools, area community colleges and the Hispanic and African-American communities to further their educational opportunities.

**Transition and Retention Services-** educational, academic success, outreach and support programs for first generation, ethnically diverse and international students are offered. Other programs are a GPS Peer Mentoring program for new international students, COE Cohort and the IISS focus group made up of a diverse student group and Celebrating Our Elders (COE)-a scholarship project supported by the University of Houston-Clear Lake. The program builds partnerships between the university, Houston-area high schools, area community colleges and the Hispanic and African-American communities to further their educational opportunities.

#### **Educational Partnerships**

A variety of partnerships are undertaken to assist students in their educational growth, including:

- Strictly Speaking Program assists international students in improving their spoken English skills by pairing international students with US students.
- University Scholars Program (USP) provides students with the support and flexibility they need by easing the initial transition to college.
- TS+ Shadow Day is a are mentoring programs that pairs students with either a UHCL faculty or staff mentor or with professionals currently working
  in different careers as a way to network and explore different career fields.
- A variety of cultural programs are designed to enhance the campus community members' understanding of different cultural practices, beliefs, and histories. Some of these include Eid, Diwali, Lunar New Year, Cinco de Mayo, Dia de los Muertos, and Cultural Extravaganza. Some of these programs are directly sponsored by IISS, while others are co-sponsored or supported by IISS.

The Dean of Students Office is committed to providing a student-centered, co-curricular atmosphere that enhances the academic mission of the university, and embraces the belief that learning is not confined solely within traditional classroom boundaries. In choosing UHCL, we hold students to the viewpoint that they have become a part of our community of scholars. As part of the UHCL experience, we expect students to make academics and being involved their highest priorities. Through programs, services, and interactions provided by the Dean of Students Office, students are expected to become citizens, dynamic leaders, and individuals who are guided by sound ethical decision making. We are steadfast in our philosophy to challenge and support UHCL students to broaden their world view in a campus culture that respects individual differences. The Dean of Students staff is responsive to student needs and interests.

#### **Primary Services and Activities**

**Information Service** – This includes distributing information about UHCL, maintaining and producing a Student Services Resource Book, and developing campus resources, flyers, banners, and resource cards. In addition, the office serves as a liaison between UHCL offices and programs

**Dean of Students** – The Dean of Students assists the university community (i.e., students and faculty) by providing advocacy to resolve conflicts, develop strategies for addressing both individual and campus-wide concerns, and serves as a liaison to other university offices on behalf of the student body. The Dean of Students Office also enforces the Student Code of Conduct and serves as the chief conduct hearing officer for the campus. The dean also develops and initiates retention strategies for the university.

**Student Assistance Center (SAC)** – The SAC is the first stop for registration assistance and general university information. SAC's primary role is to advocate and aid students in resolving inter-departmental issues. SAC provides assistance with E-Services; adding/dropping classes; explaining fee statements and class schedules; assistance with payment options, help with admissions applications, and assistance with applying for financial aid. SAC also validates student ID cards, updates student records, processes transcripts, and more.

#### **Current Initiatives**

- Promote an understanding and appreciation for the University Level Student Learning Outcomes.
- Design and implement the Student Assistance Center (i.e., "One Stop Shop" concept), which is located in the new student services classroom building.
- Create a comprehensive retention plan for the University and Student Services under the auspices of the Strategic Enrollment Management Team that will further the mission of both the University and the division.

## **Community College Advisory Council**

#### 2011-2012

When UHCL was established in 1971, the legislation provided for a statutorily created council of community and junior college presidents to advise the university president. This is the only such statutorily created advisory council in the state of Texas.

The statute provides for the Community College Advisory Council to consist of presidents/chancellors of each tax-supported community and junior college in Harris, Galveston, Fort Bend, Waller, Montgomery, Liberty, Chambers, and Brazoria counties. At the university's initiative, a bill was introduced and passed into law during the 1991 Legislative session to add Wharton to the list of counties.

The legislation calls for the advisory council to "periodically study the overall needs of the region ... for the development of programs and resources in higher education, and as a result of its studies shall make recommendations to the board of regents of the University of Houston [System] regarding the development of the departments and degree programs of the [University of Houston-Clear Lake]. The board of regents shall give careful consideration to the recommendations of the advisory council."

The interaction of UHCL, as an upper-level university, with its community and junior college partners is widely acknowledged as a state and national model of institutional cooperation and has been instrumental in the success of the university.
