#### Abstract

The Timber Cove Collection is composed of memoirs, oral history interviews, maps, brochures, event programs, a telephone directory, and miscellaneous materials, documenting the history of the Timber Cove neighborhood of Taylor Lake Village, Texas. The collection was created by Deborah Griffin, a resident of Timber Cove and director of operations at University of Houston-Clear Lake's College of Human Sciences and Humanities, during efforts to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the neighborhood. Current and former residents of Timber Cove donated items about their lives in the neighborhood, and participated in oral history interviews related to the neighborhood's history.

#### Acquisition

The collection was received by the University of Houston-Clear Lake Archives and Special Collections in multiple parts between 2008 and 2011, from various donors during the Timber Cove neighborhood's fiftieth anniversary celebrations. Most of the materials were gathered by Deborah Griffin, a resident of Timber Cove and director of operations at University of Houston-Clear Lake's College of Human Sciences and Humanities.

#### **Separated Material**

The collection was originally donated including materials that became part of two other Timber Cove collections in the UHCL Archives. Oversized maps were stored on flat oversized archival folders in the UHCL Archives and Special Collections map cases (in the appropriately labeled draw).

#### **Processing Information**

The collection never had any acquisition paperwork or registry entries created, other than deeds of gift for the materials, during the donation process. The Timber Cove Collection was originally grouped with the Timber Cove Recreation Association Records and Timber Cove Garden Club Records collections, as a single group collection. In 2011, all three collections were processed separately. The Timber Cove website was saved on a disc and is stored in the collection as well; researchers wishing to access the website records should consult UHCL Archives staff.

The oral history interviews conducted by UHCL University Archivist Shelly Kelly and Deborah Griffin had transcripts generated, which are included in the collection's box. However, the original digital recordings of audio were stored on CD or DVD discs, which are stored loose in the front of the collection's box, in plastic holders. These need to be relocated in the future to proper UHCL oral history holdings' storage. Researchers are not permitted to simply play the discs on their own laptops, or on UHCL Archives' computers. UHCL Archives staff can work to provide digital copies of the recorded interviews upon request.

#### Arrangement

The collection was arranged in folders based on types and purpose of the records, grouped in numbered series. The series include: Series I: Memoirs; Series II: Oral Histories; Series III: Taylor Lake Development Company; Series IV: Telephone Directory; Series V: Timber Cove Garden Club (Tassie Bond); Series VI: Timber Cove Recreation Association; Series VII: Woodhaven (111) Home; and Series VIII: Webpage.

#### **Historical Note**

The Timber Cove neighborhood was developed in February 1958 on farmland previously owned by the Ballentine family in an area near the modern city of Seabrook, Texas. The neighborhood's developers had conceived the Taylor Lake Village neighborhood as a lakeside getaway. Frank Marsters was one of the first home builders in the Timber Cove development. According to an oral history interview with Frank Marsters III, the original concept for the neighborhood was to be a weekend home for busy Houston, Texas, executives who wanted a lake house that was closer than the island of Galveston.

By 1961, the only lots in Timber Cove that had homes were at the ends of the development, which were nearest the water of Taylor Lake to serve as true "waterfront homes." The middle part of the development was all empty of constructed properties, as interest in the development had died down and housing sales had dropped off. One of the neighborhood developers was the Taylor Lake Development Company, whose president was William S. Crawford Jr. as of 1961. In 1961, the village of El Lago and Timber Cove neighborhood were incorporated as Taylor Lake Village, Texas. Seabrook was incorporated as a municipality in 1961. September Hurricane Carla hit the southeast Texas coast in September 1961, which further pulled interest away from individuals purchasing property and building homes in the Timber Cove neighborhood.

When NASA announced the construction of the Manned Spacecraft Center in coastal Harris County, Texas, many of the mostly male scientists and engineers came down from their headquarters at Langley Research Center in Virginia, exploring the area to locate either A) a residence to rent or purchase, or B) property to purchase for the construction of a new home. Many began locating the neighborhood situated in a large stand of woods near the coast of Taylor Lake, and felt the area was perfect. Word of mouth spread among astronauts and other NASA personnel's families, who began purchasing lots and homes in the new Timber Cove neighborhood.

The NASA Manned Spacecraft Center began construction in April 1962. The mass movement of federal personnel into coastal Houston, Texas, created a housing boom in the area that was largely due to the complete absence of sufficient housing in the Bay Area prior to the 1960s. Prior to this time, the region was largely a rural area supporting ranching and fishing industries. The housing boom driven by the Timber Cove Development led Humble Oil Company to establish its real estate and development subsidiary Friendswood Development Company in 1962. The Company created the Houston area's very first master-planned community of Clear Lake City, which by 1964 became home to a great number of NASA personnel as NASA's Apollo Program developed through the late 1960s.

Current and former Timber Cove residents planned to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the Timber Cove neighborhood in October 2008. However, plans were delayed until July 2009 after the neighborhood sustained moderate to heavy damage during Hurricane Ike hitting the Texas coast in September 2008. The Timber Cove Collection was created as part of the commemorative services to document the history of the neighborhood, led by Deborah Griffin, a resident of Timber Cove and director of operations at University of Houston-Clear Lake's College of Human Sciences and Humanities.

### **Scope and Content**

The collection is composed of memoirs, oral history interviews, maps, brochures, event programs, a telephone directory, and miscellaneous materials, documenting the history of the Timber Cove neighborhood of Taylor Lake Village, Texas. The collection was created by Deborah Griffin, a resident of Timber Cove and director of operations at University of Houston-Clear Lake's College of Human Sciences and Humanities, during efforts to celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the neighborhood. Current and former residents of Timber Cove donated items about their lives in the neighborhood, and participated in oral history interviews related to the neighborhood's history. Each folder label includes the original donor name.
