FALL SEMESTER ENDS; FINAL EXAMS SCHEDULED

UH/CLC students are reminded of several important dates concerning the end of the fall semester and the approach of the new semester.

A reading day has been scheduled Friday, Dec. 11, with no classes being held.

The Bookstore will be buying books back on Dec. 13-21 ONLY.

For students pre-registering, all fees must be paid in the Bursar's Office by Jan. 4 to secure early registration. Registrations not paid by this deadline will be canceled.

Open registration will be conducted at UH/CLC on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, Jan.11, 12 and 13. Orientation sessions for students will be held during open registration.

Spring semester classes will begin Monday, Jan. 17.

The last day for schedule revision is Thursday, Jan. 20.

Student identification cards will be either made or validated at registration or during the first week of school in Room 1-602.

With the new madness of an industrial age, dancers, like everybody else, were going a little crazy. They threw off their ballet slippers and danced barefooted close to the earth. And they moved to express deep meaning.

watching.

'LAST TANGO IN PARIS'

IS LOVE STORY

Strange as it may seem, a close look at this work reveals a love story in Romantic tradition. Paul (Marlon Brando) is in love with his dead wife, and is tortured by guilt and anxiety over her suicide. He is a man with a multifarious past and represents for Jeanne (Maria Schneider) a Romantic Stranger. In reality, Paul is masking his inability to understand death with the only life force he does understand—his virility.

They set up a fantasyland situation in an apartment where each is to know nothing about the other's life in the outside world. Sex becomes a refuge to them from the absurdity of everyday events. In Jeanne's real life, her moviemaker boyfriend is exploiting her in a cinema verite version of her childhood. However, in their apartment, Paul -nd Jeanne work out the dynamics of dominance and subservience in a series of erotic acts.

Their ideal fails when Paul attampts to formalize the affair. As the romantic trappings begin to drop and Jeanne learns the details of his real life, she wants out and tries to escape

The scene in the tango palace becomes a funny but macabre dance of death. Director Bertolucci is saying that society is concerned with the stylized techniques of the tango (sex) where emotion is performed and practiced, not really felt.

The love affair ends as Jeanne shoots Paul--the only way she can escape from him. The association of death and sex is a well-developed theme in 19th century Romantic tradition. This film reveals that sexuality may be a temporary way of evading death, but it is also an inexorable step toward it.

PATTERSON SPEAKS TO ASSOCIATION

The "green eye shade" image of accountants is changing more and more every year according to Jim Patterson, manager in the Houston office of Haskins & Sells, one of the "Big 8" national public accounting firms. Mr. Patterson spoke to members of the UH/CLC Accounting Association Wednesday night on computer auditing and how it is conducted by his firm.

The focus of the talk was on "Auditing with the Computer" and several software packages used by Haskins & Sells were discussed. Auditape, the first generalized auditing program package, eas developed by Haskins & Sells to enable the auditor in the field to use the computer to aid in the audit.

In discussing the auditor's responsibility in auditing computer systems without a background in computer science, Mr. Patterson stated, "As computer systems get more and more sophisticated, they leave us farther and farther behind." The new software packages being developed to enable the auditor to audit with the computer, rather than around or through it, are audit techniques that can help the auditor to keep abreast of developing systems and to use them in the audit process.
