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
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Open Access Week

THATCamp Clear Lake will be comprised of two parts. Friday will start things off with a series of talks from 1:00-5:00. Participants will reconvene on Saturday from 9:00-3:00 for the THATCamp. It is an "unconference," so the agenda will be determined by the participants during the first session on Saturday.
